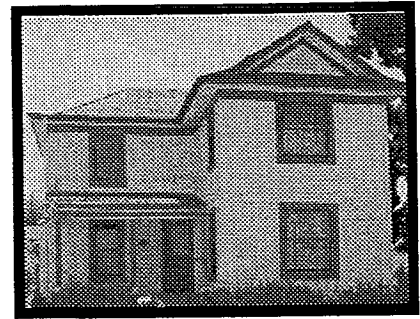

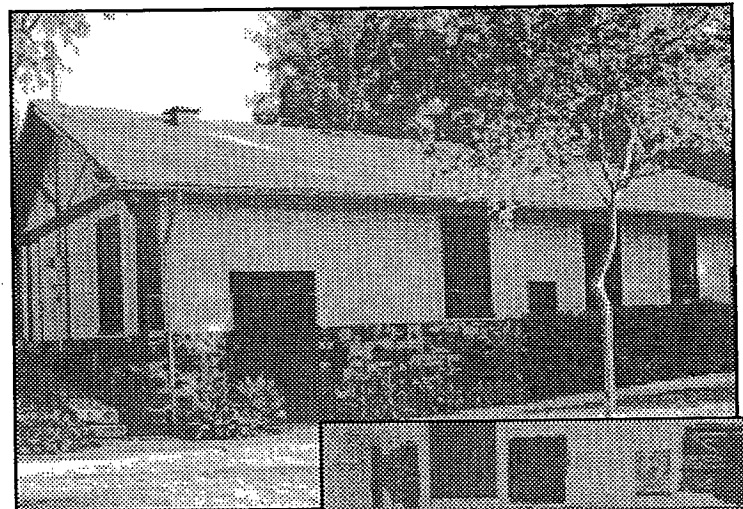
Spring member's event March 23 mark your calendars now!

We are hosting a spring membership meeting at 4 p.m., Sunday, March 23, in Collier Park, at the southernmost reaches of Palm Avenue.

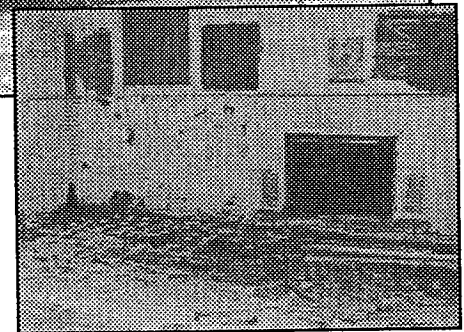
This is the site of La Mesa Historic Landmark No. 3, the Spring House and Collier Park. The Spring House, built by Colonel David C. Collier in 1907, served as a bottling works for the spring water piped to it from the hillside to the north. Kumeyaay Indians were known to camp here from time to time.

We will serve light refreshments next to the historic drinking fountain that once stood near the La Mesa Railroad Depot and have access to the interior of the Spring House.

We assume that many of you have never had the opportunity to visit the site and see where some of our area's first "designer water" was bottled. We will be sending you an invitation in early March.

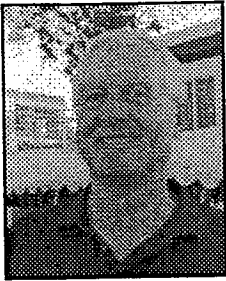

** Rev. McKinney, for whom the McKinney House is named, was one of the first ministers of the La Mesa Methodist Episcopal Church and was an early business man, lemon rancher, librarian and school trustee.*

McKinney and his family lived for many years in what is now the La Mesa Historical Society's headquarters and La Mesa Historical Landmark No. 1. The McKinney family moved to La Mesa, then known as Allison Springs, in 1899.

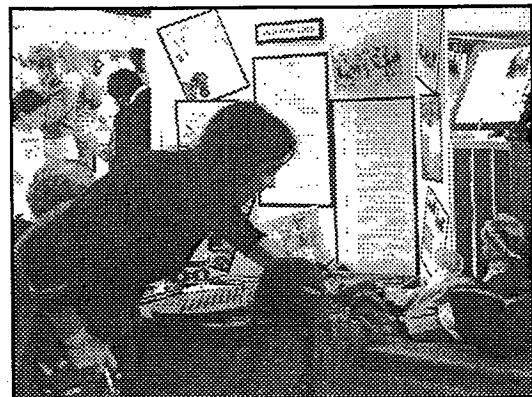
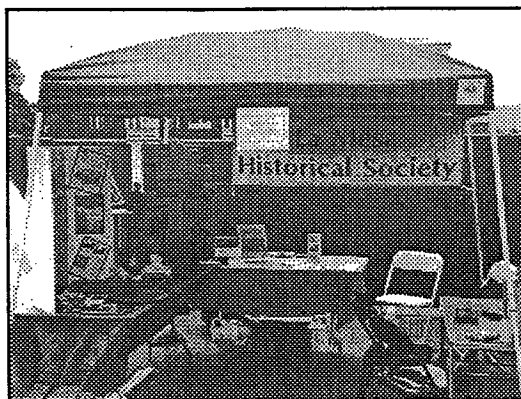

La Mesa Historical Society at Fall Back Festival



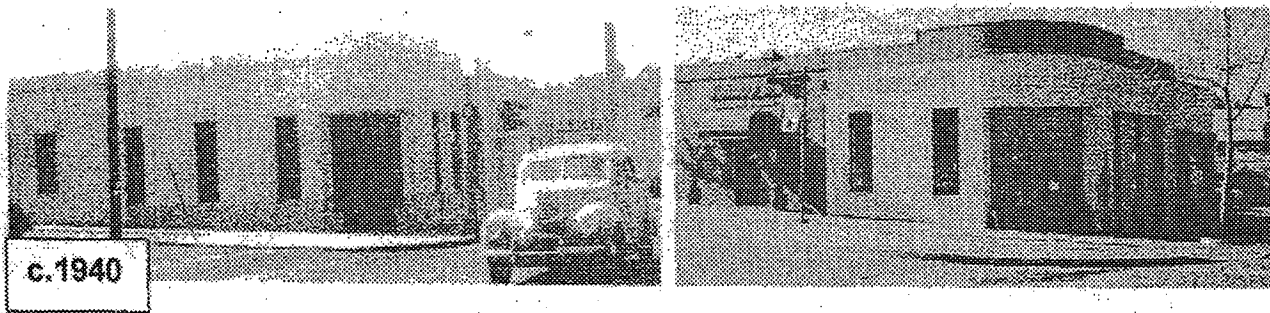
The La Mesa Historical Society participated in the Children's Historic Street Faire on Sunday, Oct. 27, 2002. The faire was a celebration of San Diego History and was held at Fifth and Island streets in the Gaslamp Quarter. The La Mesa Historical Society's booth had an antique toy display. Activities available for the children included coloring sheets, antique board games, and making a whirligig to take home. More than 800 children and their parents visited the La Mesa Historical Society booth.

La Mesa Historical Society vs. Historic Preservation Committee

The La Mesa Historical Society is a non-profit, all volunteer organization. Their goals include: educating the public on the history of La Mesa, archiving historic documents and serving as an outreach for the public on historic matters via the museum (McKinney House) and special events.

The Historic Preservation Committee has seven members (three of whom are nominated by the LMHS) and are approved by the La Mesa City Council. They are responsible for maintaining and enforcing the Historic Resources Inventory list. They have the power to approve or disapprove any alteration, modification or removal of any exterior architecture features of a designated landmark or improvement within a historic district. They recommend to the La Mesa City Council the designation of a historical landmark or historic district.

Excerpt from the walking tour...

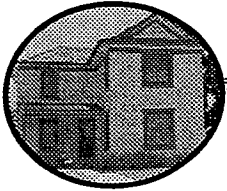
This former U.S. Post Office building is one of the few Modern commercial buildings in downtown La Mesa. It was constructed in 1939 on two lots owned by George Sheldon. The property was remodeled into offices in 1945, since the post office had, by then, moved to its Palm Avenue site. It has since been occupied by antique shops, upholstery and radio shops, taverns and others. Note the use of glass and bricks in the cutaway entrance corner, and tall, narrow metal-framed windows with transoms at the tops symmetrically spaced away on both sides of the building. The windows on the La Mesa Boulevard side are recessed while those on Fourth Street are not. An entrance has also been cut into the building on the Fourth Street side between the last two windows.
